doors opened in 1981




This has been an extremely challenging year for us as we continued to navigate this global pandemic. We are incredibly proud of our management team and staff who have provided leadership, advocacy and support to women, Two-Spirit, genderqueer, trans and non-binary folks and their children who have been impacted by violence.

Last year alone, we provided safe shelter for 107 survivors and their 58 children and responded to 764 crisis calls. We continued to work with our community partners and funders to support survivors and help to foster hope.

In spite of COVID-19, Embrave: Agency to End Violence embarked on a number of strategic initiatives to grow and strengthen the organization. We recognized that we had evolved significantly since opening our doors in 1981, and we wanted a name and brand that reflected the essence of all the work that we do to end violence. Thanks to a generous grant from the Region of Peel and input from many of you, we transformed from Interim Place into Embrave: Agency to End Violence. We hope provide and who we serve.

Thank you for believing in the work that we do and for your commitment to helping Embrave during these extremely challenging times and beyond into a “new normal”.

Our Values

Treasurer's Report

We know we are not alone in sharing that during our 2020-21 year, the pandemic presented a variety of operational and programming obstacles, but in parallel came financial challenges alike. Nonetheless the organization's leadership embraced this challenge and delivered favourable results. Embrace was fortunate to see increased support from its funders and donors reflected in a 16% increase in revenue compared to the prior year. This increased revenue was vital to support the additional 10% in expenditures that were incurred this year in comparison to last year. We ended this fiscal year with \$110,030 in excess revenues over expenditures, after accounting for amortization expenses. This excess can be put towards building our organization's reserve to support up to 6 months of operational

expenses as needed.

The greatest increase in expenditures came from increased staffing and program and supplies that were a result of responding to increased pandemic measures, organizational rebranding expenditures, and a major capital upgrade of our facility generator. We'd like to thank the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS) for being our largest funder (80% of revenue), and moreover for increasing their funding to compensate for the increased expenditures the organization realized as they maintained full operations during COVID-19. We also would like to take this opportunity to thank United Way GTA for their continued and ongoing support of our shelter and Community Support and Outreach Program.

We continued to be the beneficiary of several community grants and would like to acknowledge and appreciate the project and program funding we have received from the Canadian Women's Foundation, Women Shelter Canada, the Region of Peel, the Community Foundation of Mississauga's Hazel McCallion and Pendle Fund, Ontario Realtors Care Foundation,

Ecclesiastical and the Ontario Trillium Foundation. Because of the support that you all showed us during this past year our grant revenues were up 82% for a total sum of \$391,852. Because of all of you we were able to continue to deliver essential, innovative supports to survivors of gender-based-violence.

Fundraising through a pandemic was a huge learning experience for the organization, as we had to be creative with virtual events and diverse opportunities for donors to contribute. We had to cancel our two flagship fundraising events and convert a third event into a virtual experience. Even with these changes, the fundraising team was successful in raising \$351,629 which is only a 20% reduction compared to our prior year.

Embrace Agency to End Violence is truly fortunate to have the long-standing support of our funders, donors, sponsors, volunteers, and our various community partners. Our mission and work would not be possible without this on-going partnership. We thank you for being a part of our team and look forward to accomplishing even more together for our community.

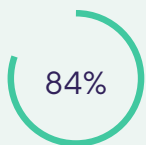

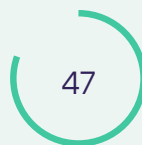

On Our Own Peer Support Program

The On Our Own programs enabled survivors to explore their experiences of violence and trauma through collaborative discussions with others who have experienced similar challenges. The groups and 1:1 supports worked from a trauma-informed approach to help connect survivors' experiences of violence to broader systems and supported survivors in determining what supports they needed.



Sexual Violence Support Program

The Sexual Violence Support Program, BraveTalk, provided confidential and non-judgmental supports to survivors of any form of sexual violence. These supports could be accessed anywhere by survivors and were delivered by telephone, email, video chat and other online platforms.



Out of Isolation

Out of Isolation: Survivor's Meet Up continues to meet each week on Thursday evenings. This virtual drop-in group is for survivors of all types of violence and is a space for folks to connect with other survivors, share their experiences and access supports.

A website redesign was undertaken in 2020 with the aim of optimizing the user interface to enhance accessibility for all users. Our new website was developed in accordance with Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities (AODA) Compliance

All of our services are available to all women, two-spirit, gender queer, trans and non-binary survivors of violence.





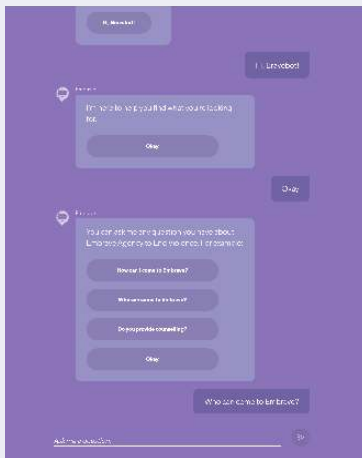

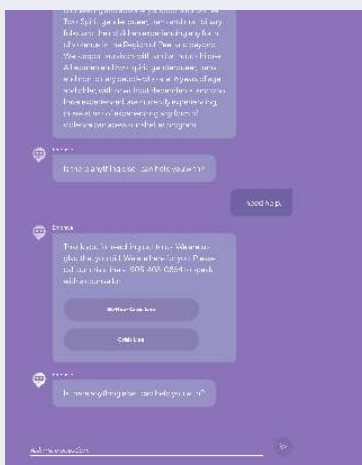
Bravebot is a computer-based automated question and answer platform allows survivors in need of support to securely and anonymously access informational resources tailored to individual needs. It is imperative that all survivors in Peel Region are aware of and able to readily access supports when they are needed most. Our new branding better reflects the diverse experiences and voices of survivors who need to access our services, especially those who have been marginalized due to systemic racism, discrimination, and oppression.

Our organizational rebranding process has enabled Embrave to ensure that the organization's various touchpoints are accessible to, and meaningful for, survivors from marginalized communities, including (but not limited to) Indigenous communities; consumer survivors; survivors who are deaf and hard-of-hearing; survivors living with a disability; survivors without status/with precarious immigration status; and survivors who have experienced sexual violence. Through this undertaking we have reduced some of the barriers survivors from marginalized communities who have experienced violence encounter when seeking and accessing supports.

The impacts of COVID-19 will be longstanding, and the increased risk survivors now face will endure long after the immediate medical crisis has been contained. In order to create safer communities now and into the future we will strive to ensure that communities have access to responsive virtual supports during times of crisis and know where to access supports when needed.



Campaigns & Events

Steps to End Gender-Based Violence Walk



Embrace Agence to End Violence hosted our first-ever virtual Steps to End Violence Against Women Walk on September 27th, 2020. We may not have been walking as a group, but we were together in spirit as we walked, biked, and rolled in support of survivors of gender-based violence. Collectively, we walked to ensure that no one in our community has to face gender-based violence alone.

This year's walk raised funds at

a time when they were desperately needed to meet the needs of survivors of violence in our community, who continue to face increased risk due to the COVID-19 pandemic. With your support we surpassed our fundraising target, raising a total of \$51,875- or, 219% of our fundraising goal!

The success of #Steps2020 was a testament to the passion, dedication, generosity, and commitment of our supporters. We are truly grateful to all who stepped up to raise funds for #Steps2020, Embrace, and the survivors of violence who rely on our services.



The Unstoried Series

Embracing Brave: A Tale of Survival

Embracing Brave: A Tale of Survival is a short film inspired by the true story of a participant in Embrave's 'On Our Own' Peer Program for survivors of violence incarcerated in Ontario. This film is the first of the Unstoried Series, a film series produced by Embrave: Agency to End Violence, formerly known as Interim Place, in collaboration with Fela. The film was directed by the incredibly talented up-and-coming director Kimberly Veitch and stars Ellyn Jade, a phenomenal actor best known for her roles in "Burden of Truth," "Letterkenny" and "Frontier."

Powerful and compelling but not at all unique, this woman's story echoes those of program participants as well as the vast majority of women currently incarcerated in Canada. Through her story we shed light on the overrepresentation of Indigenous women in Canadian prisons that results from colonialism.



Embracing Brave: A Tale of Survival

What Does it Take to be a GBV Ally?

In 2021 Embrave launched the second campaign in our Unstoried Series of films, What Does it Take to be a GBV Ally? So, what does it take to be an ally in the work to end gender-based violence (GBV)? This year-long campaign seeks to spark critical conversations on allyship that are not happening enough (or in the spaces they should be) in Peel Region. We want to encourage you to think about what it takes to be an ally in social, institutional, recreational, and religious spheres. To help start the conversation, we asked eight popular influencers hailing from across Canada to share what they think it takes to be an ally in the work to end GBV. The campaign draws upon our influencers' insights to explore some of the strategies we can all start taking today as allies in the work to end gender-based violence. Community members, organizations, and corporate partners alike are invited to join us in taking part in this free campaign to learn about allyship in the work to end gender-based violence.



What Does it Take to be a GBV Ally?

Embrave is relentless in leading change and striving towards a society free from violence. We amplify the voices of survivors and celebrate what they are able to overcome; we educate the public and we inspire systemic change by taking action and collaborating with other organizations in the community. Peel Committee Against Woman Abuse

The Peel Committee Against Woman Abuse (PCAWA) has been in existence since 1984. The Peel Committee Against Woman Abuse is a group of individuals representing various agencies in the Region of Peel. PCAWA's mandate is to promote a comprehensive and effective coordinated response to ending Violence Against Women (VAW)/Gender-Based Violence (GBV) in the Region of Peel.



Frontline Worker Survey

Frontline worker survey: The PCAWA systems integration group collected data from a broad landscape of social service organizations who provided supports to survivors of GBV during the COVID-19 pandemic. The final report has been published to the PCAWA website and shared with the Regional COVID-19 Response Table.



Safety Planning Booklet

The Safety Planning Booklet was updated in November 2020 and is now accessible in 7 languages on the PCAWA website.

PCAWA's vision is to end VAW (GBV) in the Region of Peel. PCAWA's mission is to facilitate and advocate for a coordinated and effective community response to VAW (GBV) in the Region of Peel.



Enhanced VAW Protocol Evaluation

The evaluation of the Enhanced VAW Protocol is complete and the final report has been shared with PCAWA members. The Safety Planning & Risk Assessment Tool, Services map, AR/AO framework, and information on intersectionality were identified as useful by participants.



Enhanced VAW Protocol Training

As of mid-2019, 31 organizations have received training on the Enhanced VAW Protocol. 52 individuals who received training were VAW Service Providers, and 28 were non-VAW Service Providers. Training activities were temporarily suspended in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic and have resumed. The PCAWA has successfully engaged non-VAW and private sectors partners with training on the Enhanced VAW Protocol.

Why do you volunteer with Embrave?

I initially volunteered with Embrave because I had retired and wanted to spend more time giving back to my community.
